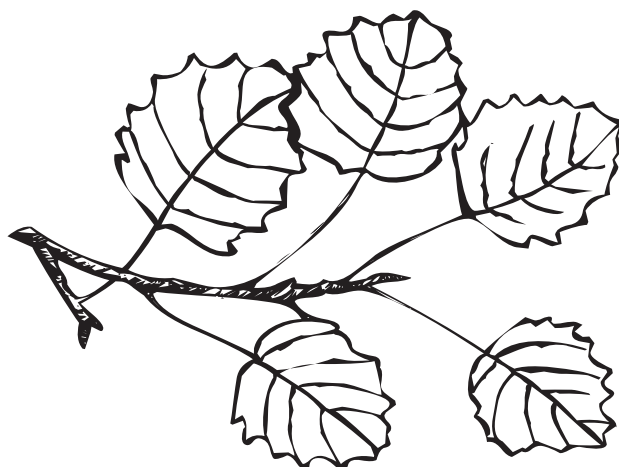

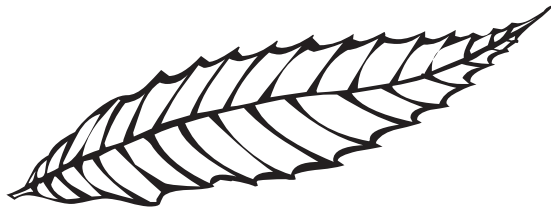

The New Testament begins with a multitude of angels singing at the birth of Jesus. It ends with the annihilation of pain and sorrow. We may sometimes think of Jesus as a man of sorrows, but he described himself and his disciples as a bridal party exempt from fasting! He displayed what sooner or later we all discover, that those who are doing the most for others are in fact the happiest people. Jesus found joy in his hope for the future, the knowledge that he was doing what was God's will for him, and that he was doing a great service for mankind. Jesus saw a magnificent outcome out of what appeared to be meager beginnings. He was certain of the ultimate victory of right over wrong. In this way I think we can see a connection between joy and courage. Dwelling on how much you gain from sacrifice and giving instead of what you give up helps us not only to be joyful, but also to have courage. No one ever has found real joy in a selfish life or by doing wrong. Be of good cheer!

The parable of the good Samaritan tells us about the evil robbers who left a man beaten and half-dead on the side of the road; it tells of a Levite and Priest who crossed to the other side, and the Samaritan who stopped to help. All that we know about the injured man is that he was in need. Jesus was willing to help anyone in need. True religion involves generosity: it involves unselfishness in giving and also unselfishness in receiving. When Jesus was wronged, he did not think first of the wrong that was done to him, but of the needs of those who did him wrong.

Love does not keep a record of wrongs. When you find others difficult, think what they must endure in you. Jesus loved his enemies and forgave them. He befriended all sorts of people. Be generous.

How often is anger due to personal resentment? This can make us feel that anger is something to be ashamed of. There are, however, good reasons to be angry. Jesus was indignant at the evils ruining men: vices, dishonesty, hyposcrisy, pride... Without the abhorrence of evil, kindness becomes purposeless and diminished. Yet, condemnation alone accomplishes nothing. Jesus looked for and appreciated the beginnings of goodness in people as well; he could see the potential of what might be. He was never indignant of private wrongs, only of public evils. Hate evil because of the love you have for people.

How often do we spend our time wishing that things were different, had better results, or suited us better? If anyone had to endure adverse circumstances, it was Jesus. He was misunderstood, thought crazy, plotted against, maligned... He knew what crucifixion was and that it awaited him. However, Jesus was never shaken because he had absolute trust in the good purpose of God. Trouble either embitters or ennobles a person. One becomes either resentful, discouraged and cynical or humbler, kinder and more spiritual. Trouble is a test of character.

A lie is the foundational sin. Jesus was without guile and what he found the most fault with was hypocrisy. Hypocrisy cares little for real goodness, desiring only to appear well without having to pay the price that truth costs. It can also be found in being willing to appear worse than one really is by not confessing Christ or standing up for truth when the opportunity arises. Jesus would not lie to save himself from the cross. It was far more important to be right in the sight of God than to have the approval of his fellowmen. He showed that the real evil is in one's secret thoughts rather than a faulty keeping of the law. Those who are truly sincere are also those who can respect themselves.

Character is formed as the result of moral struggle, therefore temptation is an essential part of the battle for uprightness. It is only because of the possibility of deceit that honesty becomes a virtue. Temptation must be conquered in the mind. Character can be transformed for good or bad by the company you keep. Jesus developed his character through the temptations he conquered in submission to his Father's will, not by an inability to sin. Power is always accompanied by the temptation to misuse it, and the more power, the more temptation. He was tempted to use his power for selfish purposes, to protect himself from suffering, and to fulfill the expectations of the people and set up the kingdom then and there. His self-restraint kept him obedient to his heavenly Father.

Jesus was not afraid to speak out against the oppression, hypocrisy, corruption, and injustice he saw around him. Jesus was a disturbing personality to the religious leaders of the time. He sought to introduce a better type of spiritual life, and nobler religious thought when they were happy with what they had. Jesus saw humanity as a family with one Father, all men as brothers, and each individual of boundless value. The ideal for humanity being one family with God as the Father. Although he was friendly towards all, he had a special friendship with his disciples nurtured by common faith, hope and devotion to the same cause. The ideal love in 1 Corinthians 13 was his.

The spiritual quality of a man comes from the reasons why he is good. Jesus was not good because he thought he was a good person, he was not good so that he would be admired, he was good because he was doing his Father's will and his Father was good. He recognized that God is the source of all that is worthy in us and so there is no room for pride in ourselves. He made regular use of prayer not to get God to change His plans, but to enter into spiritual fellowship with God's purpose. Humility and dependence on God is the only way for God to work through us. Pray without ceasing.

We have looked at the character of Jesus Christ - his joy, generosity, indignation, loyalty, endurance, sincerity, discipline, fearlessness, love, priorities, and the spirit that pervaded all his actions. In Jesus we see all that God intended when He created the first man and woman. Jesus said in John 17:19 "And for their sakes I sanctify myself, that they also might be sanctified through the truth" - he lived his life at its best for others. Why did Jesus die? His death showed us the desperate sinfulness of sin in the actions taken against him, and that we need to choose sides. At the same time, it was a witness of the love he and his Father have for us. His died as a final act of giving up the flesh, and choosing the spirit. And God raised him to be our Saviour.
